## 64 Students Receive Scholarship

Like every year, Society for Social Service (SSS) observed 43rd death anniversary of the father of the nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman this year too with due respect. On this occasion, SSS adopted month-long different programs.

In line with its continuity, a special meeting was held in the office room of the executive director of SSS on 1 August. In the meeting, Abdul Hamid Bhuiyan, Executive Director of SSS put importance on observing the 43rd death anniversary of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman both at the central and field-level offices of SSS. To show respect to the day, officers and staffs from all sectors of SSS wore black badges throughout the month of August. ## Distribution of 400 plants

#### Tree plantation campaign of SSS

SSS facilitated a tree plantation campaign under the sports and cultural program of PKSF on 23 September. Under the daylong activities, four hundred fruit and timber saplings were distributed among students of Binnafair High School and SSS-Poura Ideal High School of Tangail Sadar upazila.

The slogan of the tree plantation campaign was, "Decorate our cities, lives and nature with trees and thus save our green environment for the future."

With financial support from PKSF, SSS facilitated the tree plantation campaign in Binnafair High School at 10 am and in SSS-Poura Ideal High School at 3 pm on 23 September. Apart from distributing saplings among the students, SSS also planted some trees in the school compound. At that time, teachers of the schools and officers and staffs of SSS were present.

The distributed plants were: mango, berry, litchi, guava, sapodilla, jamrul, neem, mahogany, eucalyptus, teak tree etc.

## Brahma Cow Rearing: a New Dimension of Self-reliance

Livestock is an important component of our agriculture-based economy. In every rural house, poultry, livestock and other domestic animals are reared. Directly about one crore and indirectly 50 lac people are engaged in livestock rearing (source: Bangladesh Economic Review 2013). These 1.50 crore people contribute to the nutrition-supply for the entire country. Domestically, 2.40 crore cows are reared in our country (Bangladesh Economic Review, 2016-17). But the methods they use cannot prove to be much more profitable for them. They need to rear high productive breeds of cows in improved methods. Brahma is such a breed of cow. Normally, this breed of ox can grow about 400 kilograms (10 maunds) in a year and 1,200 kilograms (30 maunds) in three years.

#### The Background of the Breed

The Brahma cow is a fast-growing breed. It is very much habituated to our weather having comparatively high immunity. On the other hand, it requires less cost of rearing compared to native cows because Brahma is an ancient breed of our continent. A researchers' team visited India, Bangladesh and other surrounding area from 1854 to 1926 and collected 266 oxen and 22 cows for breed development. One of their transformed breed was Brahma. Presently, it has been well-known as an American breed.

In order to defend milk deficiency, different milk-producing cow breeds were researched in the post-independence period. But there was no mentionable projects adopted for beef production, although there was a growing demand for beef. Bangladesh Livestock Directorate thought about it and took initiatives to adopt Beef Cattle Development Project. The project experimentally imported 10 thousand semen specimens of Brahma in 2008. More 60 thousand semen were also imported after different-level examination and observation. 37 thousand of them were inserted into the cows in different area of the country. The Brahma oxen produced from them were brought to the Artificial Insemination and Research Center in Savar. At present, semen of Brahma are produced there following proper scientific method and supplied within the country.

#### Productivity and Demand

In every sector, the primary requirements for profit-gain are productivity, cost-reduction and demand. Brahma cow undoubtedly fulfills these three requirements. Our native cows grow up to 160 to 200 kilograms in three years whereas a Brahma cow can gain weight of 1,200 kilograms



within the period. A Brahma cow has five to six times more productivity compared to a native cow. On the other hand, a Brahma cow needs comparatively less cost to be fattened than a native-bred cow as it is habituated to eat normal and natural foods. The medical expense and mortality rate of a Brahma cow are also comparatively less as it has high immunity. Only improved cow-rearing system and necessary food-supply are enough for them.

The beef of Brahma has more demand compared to other animal meats. Now-a-days, the buyers or consumers are more conscious than before. They are now interested to take healthy and genuine foods. The Brahma cow fattening requires no medicines or chemicals and this cow genuinely produces a good amount of meats. This cow also takes natural and normal components as food. As a result, the Brahma beef is free from any poisonous materials, harmful fats and possesses more nutrition compared to native cow meats. So, the propensity and potentiality of demand of Brahma beef will be higher compared to that of other native cattle.

## **Market Analysis**

According to World Health Organization, a healthy and normal human being needs 81 kilograms of meats to eat to be active in a year. According to the statistics of Bangladesh Economic Review (2016-17), we have 14.35 million tons of annual demand for meats in our country, but we produce only 7.15 million tons of meats in a year. So, we have more than 50 per cent of meat deficiency compared to the overall demand. In order to meet this demand, we have to import 40 per cent of total meats from the neighboring countries including India. Considering this fact, the Brahma cow rearing has huge possibilities and potentialities in our country. There is also opportunities to export the beef after meeting the country-demand. But both government and non-government initiatives and their coordination are required in this sector.

#### Nutritional Values

In our country, there are different concepts and views on eating beefs. Many people keep themselves away from eating their favorite food, beef considering different health risks. But in reality, beef is a tasty and adequately nutritious food. Regarding health risk, almost every food can be risky and harmful to our health if not taken in exact proportion and carefully. The food risk depends mainly on its production, preservation and cooking method. The meats production of Brahma cow follows natural and organic methods. As a result, the beef is comparatively free from fat and health-risk.

According to the analysis of the USA Agriculture Department, the Brahma beef contains high amount of protein. The protein is full of Amino Acid and its good for our bones and muscles. 100 grams of the beef contains 22.6 grams of protein and 2.6 grams of fat. It also has adequate minerals such as zinc, iron, selenium, phosphorus, magnesium, sodium, potassium, copper etc. These minerals keeps daily activities of our body active, protect and increase immunity of our body.

The beef of Brahma is filled with necessary vitamins too. It has vitamin B<sup>12</sup>, B<sup>6</sup>, riboflavin and niacin. Vitamin B<sup>12</sup> is very important to our body. It is essential for our mental health. According to Harvard School of Public Health, our body needs 2.4 milligrams of vitamin B<sup>12</sup> every day. We can meet our daily needs of minerals, vitamins and protein by taking only three ounces (85.05 grams) of beefs every day. The cholesterol in Brahma beef does not put any harmful effect on our body. Those who are suffering from excessive cholesterol and heart or other chronic diseases, they must eat beef according to doctor's advice. On the other hand, fat and processed meats cause harms to our body. So we must eat fresh meats and avoid fatty, frozen and processed meats.

#### Initiatives of SSS

SSS has been working for a long time for the development of livestock sector. It has been implementing different activities on cow rearing and beef fattening. One of them is LIFT (Learning and Innovation Fund to Test New Ideas) project. A sub-project of LIFT is Alleviating Poverty through the Extension of High Beef-productive Cows (Brahma) project. SSS started to implement the project in August 2017 with financial support from PKSF. Main objectives of the project include: rearing Brahma cow in modern method, creating employment for poor people and increasing their income. SSS has been implementing the project in Sakhipur and Kalihati upazila of Tangail

Activities under the project include: establishing parent-stock farms, supplying semen of Brahma and high productive cows, establishing demonstration farms on Brahma cow rearing at the beneficiary-level, arranging necessary training, baseline survey and workshops and so on.

Apart from two above-mentioned upazilas, farmers from other regions in the working area will be eligible to take credits for Brahma cow rearing under Agrasar (entrepreneur) and Sufalan (Agriculture) credit program. For this purpose, they will get technical and other support from SSS.

## Bangladesh Adolescents Conference 2018

Under the sports and cultural program of PKSF, SSS arranged the District-level (Tangail) Finale of Bangladesh Adolescents Conference 2018 on 29 July in the conference room of SSS Head Office. A total of 80 children and adolescents selected from different schools and colleges of Tangail Sadar upazila participated in various events of the competition. PKSF has been providing financial support in the program.

Shaheen Ashrafi, Secondary Education Officer of Tangail Sadar upazila was present as chief guest in the closing ceremony of the event. At that time, Abdul Latif Miah, Director (ECDP), Sadhan Chandra Goon, Director (Training), Santosh Chandra Paul, Director (Credit), Mubarak Hossain, Assistant Director (Publication), Shamsul Arefin, Senior Program Manager (HRD) and so on were present there.

Under the ENRICH program of SSS, three ENT camps were organized in Tangail and Gazipur. A total of 232 patients received healthcare services in the camps.
